The Principal's Piece

<u>A pretty simply pathway to sainthood</u> ... In fact, this is Pope Francis' one-pointstrategy to sainthood!

Pope Francis recently said, "It's so rotten, gossip. At the beginning, it seems to be something enjoyable and fun, like a piece of candy. But at the end, it fills the heart with bitterness and also poisons us ... I tell you the truth, I am convinced that if each one of us would purposely avoid gossip, at the end, we would become a saint! It's a beautiful path!"

These words from Pope Francis, that relate so purposefully to last weekend's Gospel reading below, illustrate Jesus words, "No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit" (Lk 6:43).

Indeed, our words shape and reflect what's in our hearts. Is this perhaps one of life's greatest lessons for our children and for us as adults who ultimately teach by example.

After a week of unprecedented turmoil in our Church, we are so clearly seeing more than ever before the vital importance of leading with purity by the example we live and set. Being a parent carries such awesome responsibility; by setting/'living' a good example each day for our children, we are well on the way to sainthood.

(Last weekend's Gospel: Luke 6:39-45)

He also told them a parable ... Can one blind person guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit?

A disciple is not superior to the teacher; but a fully trained disciple will be like a teacher.

Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the great log in your own?

How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out that splinter in your eye," when you cannot see the great log in your own? Hypocrite! Take the log out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter in your brother's eyes.

There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit.

Every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles.

Good people draw what is good from the store of goodness in their hearts; bad people draw what is bad from the store of badness. For the words of the mouth flow out of what fills the heart.

Fr Jim's homily from last weekend - in response to Cardinal Pell's conviction:

The conviction of Cardinal George Pell on serious criminal charges has shocked, angered and saddened Catholics around Australia. It will impact each of us differently, potentially touching into our own stories in painful ways. We may be uncertain how to respond. The response of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, and therefore the official response of the Church is this: we respect the legal system and its processes. We recognise Cardinal Pell's right to appeal this verdict. It is not for us to weigh up the merits of the legal case and to judge either way. None of us have heard all the evidence.

If Cardinal Pell was the first priest to be convicted of such a heinous crime it would be bad enough. But what makes it so devastating is that he is just one of many, too many, far too many clergy convicted of the similar crimes over the past twenty years. "Oh no, not again" is likely the response of many of us. The sexual abuse of minors by clergy is the *log in our eyes*, to use Jesus' graphic image. Now is not the time for us to deflect blame, to minimise or compare. People had the right to expect that priests and bishops who stood in front of them proclaiming Jesus Christ would live by his values. That we have not always done so is the hypocrisy of which Jesus speaks in the gospel. From this we cannot shy away, for this I apologise, on behalf of my fellow clergy.

It may help for us to have some context. I speak now not of Cardinal Pell's case in particular, but the cumulative effect of clerical abuse in the church. We can speak of three kinds of victims of abuse. The first is the primary victim, the person directly attacked. And in a group of this many people I know that there are people here who have been the primary victim of such abuse. To you, I also want to apologise for the times when you have not been believed. A significant shift in the church in the last twenty years, I hope, is that we now listen to those brave people who come forward to speak of what has been done to them.

Then there are the secondary victims. For every primary victim there are a dozen family members and close friends who both feel the impact of the original crime, and live with the maladaptive behaviours of drug abuse and self-harm which we now know can be the result of childhood abuse. Many more of you have experienced this in the people you love.

Finally there are the tertiary victims, which includes everybody who is scandalised, betrayed and disillusioned by what has happened in the church to which they belong. That includes all of us here, and those who have already walked away, unable to bear it. If you are clinging to your faith by your fingertips today, please hang on. And to all of you who courageously commit to your faith and your church despite such scandals, thank you.

Let's look at how the scandal of clerical abuse affects us.

We all have a worldview which we have created, shown by this box. In this box the events of our lives and the world make sense of what we believe. But then an event happens which is outside of our worldview. It may be a tragedy, or personal suffering, or the betrayal of trust from repeated offences of Catholic clergy. This doesn't fit with what we know and believe. So to make sense of it we do one of three things:

1. We can shift our worldview around this new phenomena. Crime, abuse and evil become the centre, and we no longer believe that there is any good in the church, or that there is a good and loving God. These people have already walked away from the church.

2. We can deny this new phenomena because it doesn't fit our worldview. This was the response of the whole Church for decades. "Surely not" we said "A priest couldn't" we said. To continue to do so is myopic, and is a form of fundamentalism which does us no good and harms others.

3. But if we have courage we can expand our worldview to include the old and the new. We draw a bigger box. We somehow come to grips with the paradox that the Church and its leaders are both good and noble, and sinful and evil, to use Pope Francis' word. We wrestle with the contradiction but in the process our hearts are enlarged by the powerful work of the Holy Spirit and we learn to accept both the good and the bad in our own lives. We become more welcoming, less judgemental, and more able to embrace life as it brings to us both blessings and challenges. This is my hope for each of us, that we may grow stronger and wiser through this pain.

Jesus told us to remove the log from our eyes. How do we rid ourselves of this scourge, and rid ourselves we must. We absolutely must stamp out the cultures, the beliefs and the behaviours which have allowed abuse to happen with such infernal frequency. I offer you some hope:

1. Church policies have changed. If an allegation of misconduct is made against a priest he is now immediately stood aside from ministry while investigation takes place. The Church no longer waits for criminal charges to be place. Priests are no longer given the benefit of the doubt. The protection of our children and the prevention of further harm now takes priority over the reputation of the priest or of the Church. This has happened in our diocese in the last ten years. This is a change. This is an improvement.

2. For the past twenty five years men seeking to enter seminary have been assessed by a psychologist to screen out any pathologies which could dispose a man to sexual misconduct. The bar for admission is higher than ever before, and our need for many priests does not trump our need for good priests. In decades past all discussion of sexuality was taboo in seminaries, but beginning in my time in seminary twenty five years ago seminarians now undertake serious psycho sexual formation for healthy celibate sexuality. I am hopeful, indeed confident, that this formation has given my generation of priests the tools of emotional intelligence we need to ensure that we do not become the abusers of the future.

3. The focus of the Church has now moved to safeguarding, which is the proactive prevention of harm in all its forms to our children and vulnerable people. This is a work in progress as we take on the collective challenge, all of us, laity and clergy, of creating a safe church where we no longer have a blinding log in our eyes, but can see clearly to again proclaim the love of Jesus Christ and to be his good news to the world.

Professional Learning at OLoD:

 Last week, we hosted Ron Ritchhart at OLD. Ron is a Senior Research Associate at Harvard Project Zero where his work focuses on such issues as teaching for understanding, the development of intellectual character, creative teaching, making students' thinking visible, and most recently the development of school and classroom culture. Ron worked in 2 of our classrooms during the day and then he stayed on at OLD to lead a combined staff meeting with staff from Holy Family, Lindfield.

Specifically, with Holy Family, we are learning about how we can best assess thinking and best report student progress in this area to parents.

- 2. This coming weekend on Saturday, all OLoD teachers will participate in a full day of Professional Learning regarding Literacy with a specific focus on Writing. Part of this day will be led by CSO Literacy leaders and part of the day will be led by our very own Mrs Kathy Gray.
- 3. Tonight we have a Parent Education session on Mathematics that will be led by Miss Kirsty Thorpe. There is a bumper crowd registered; I sense they must have heard about the wonderful success of Kirsty's Maths sessions for parents last year!

The Assistant Principal's Piece—Miss Kirsty Thorpe

Maths Parent Education Sessions: I am very much looking forward to our first Parent Education session of the year. An amazing number of parents have registered (the most we have had at a Parent Ed session!!) and I am excited to explore some really important topics relating to learning Maths with you – such as Mathematical Mindset, Maths Anxiety, Conceptual vs Procedural Understanding and of course play lots of games that can be altered to suit all learning needs and ages. A reminder for those who have registered that our second session is Monday 11th March, 6.30-7.30pm. For those who have missed out this time or are unable to make it, I will run the same sessions later in the year during the day time. Keep an eye out in the newsletter for more opportunities to learn about different topics at OLD.



International Celebrations: Earlier in the year we had a wonderful celebration of Chinese New Year at assembly and I am looking forward to working with any students with Irish backgrounds for St Patrick's Day on March 17th. Please come and see me, if you would like to help prepare a short assembly piece (for Monday 18th).

Harmony Day – 21st March: A very important and special day in the school calendar is Harmony Day (21st March). This is a day when we can celebrate the amazing cultural diversity we have at OLD. We invite everyone to come dressed in their traditional clothes and come along to our whole school assembly in the hall 9-10am. We will join together as a school community to live out our school vision 'Ignite, Innovate and Include in Mercy'. Parents are also welcome to come dressed in their traditional clothing – we would love to see and learn about some amazing traditions and clothing.



Social and Emotional Wellbeing Survey: Last week all students in Year 2-6 completed an online assessment to ascertain how our students are tracking with their social and emotional development. There is more information about the survey below from ACER (Australian Council for Educational Research). Students in Year 1 and Kindergarten will complete the survey later in the year (when literacy and ICLT skills are further developed). The assessments do not analyse students on an individual level, rather it gives teachers data of their class and it provides leadership with information about the trends and patterns of our current students and longitudinally into the future. Social and emotional Wellbeing is often referred to as the 'oil of learning'; because without a happy, confident, resilient student who feels safe and comfortable, there will not be any academic learning taking place. The development of Social and Emotional Skills is an important part of the relationship between parents and the school – we all play an important part in developing these essential life skills.

The survey: Students' academic competence is frequently measured. However, many schools want to gauge if students are making progress on less tangible qualities such as social and emotional growth. The ACER Social-Emotional Wellbeing (SEW) Survey offers schools the opportunity to survey their students and generate a report on a wide variety of social, emotional and behavioural outcomes of their student population. The ACER Social-Emotional Wellbeing Survey (SEW) uses an 'ecological', positive-psychology model of the social and emotional wellbeing of young people. It is a confidential strength-based survey for students aged three to 18 years. The SEW Survey provides schools with information about their student population (whole school, specific year levels or targeted groups), which can be used to direct planning and problem-solving efforts.

Season of Lent



Tomorrow begins the season of Lent. During this time, we reflect on the inner meaning of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. It is a time that calls us to consider the suffering that occurs in our own lives, but most importantly, the lives others. It challenges us to follow Jesus and walk with the weak, the wounded and the suffering. We are called to reach out to others and be grateful for the gifts we have.

During the time of Lent each year, our school proudly participates in Project Compassion to raise funds for the world's poor. The theme for Project Compassion 2019 is based around **hope** and **giving Lent 100%** in the name of hope.

Bishop Greg O'Kelly, Former Chairman of Caritas explains 'Hope is one of the three pillars of Christian virtue. The other two being faith and charity. It is a powerful force for good and often helps to transform lives. Hope helps us to face life's challenges and sustains us as we work alongside the most marginalised and vulnerable communities to achieve better lives. Pope Francis has said that: "Jesus has given us a light that shines in the darkness; defend it, protect it. This unique light is the greatest richness entrusted to your life." This light, is the light of hope.'

Last year Our Lady of Dolours began an initiative to encourage children to IGNITE into action, INNOVATE ideas and INCLUDE those in need.

This year we are going to continue this rewarding and meaningful project. The children are encouraged to 'earn' some money by offering to help out at home doing small chores for others. You may want to pay \$0.50 for every day that they tidy up, or perhaps \$1 for putting the laundry away. Please note, we are encouraging `chores' above and beyond the usual expectations parents have.

How much they get paid is entirely up to you, so let them INNOVATE and practise their negotiation skills! Children can then donate their earnings to Project Compassion. This is an exciting project to help the students develop their creative thinking, along with strengthening their sense of social justice and caring for others. All children will come home with a form to list their earnings.


